This summer I met one of my heroes and learnt to do something I love. All that and touring the National Gallery as well. Yup – I went to Ottawa in June for Quilt Canada! I have always admired Installation Artists and Amanda McCavour is one of the best. She is a Toronto-based artist who works with stitch to create large-scale embroidered installations. By sewing into fabric that dissolves in water, she can build up stitched lines that create strength so that when the fabric is dissolved, the thread drawing can hold together without a base.

At Quilt Canada, she was teaching two different courses over a couple of days and I took them both. It was a rules-out-the-window, follow your gut and have fun kind of an experience. All guided and supported by the generous, knowledgeable and passionately creative woman that is Amanda McCavour.

Day One was learning how to make a ribbon scarf using soft water-soluble stabilizer to sandwich and contain the ribbons and fabric as you sewed it together.

Day Two was about creating a landscape by layering and stacking many types of wools, ribbon, fabric and thread onto a sticky water-soluble surface, covering the whole mess with the non-sticky stabilizer and sewing like crazy.

Let's talk silk painting! In early May I took a five-day intensive painting class with Karen Sistek in Port Angeles, Washington. Artist and silk painting master Karen Sistek has developed the method of using a spray starch as an anti-fusant. Using this method, you don't need to use Gutta or resist lines. Her work is amazing; such detail and control, paired with bold composition. Karen unselfishly describes her techniques and freely shares her knowledge.

Our first day we spent preparing our 16 mm habotai silk and attaching it to PVC pipes so the silk doesn't touch any surface. We also prepared a second silk for testing the colours we mixed and to practice different techniques.

After drawing our design on the silk, we began painting and learning about the dyes. We used Jacquard Red Label dyes which need to be steamed after painting to set permanently into the silk.



By the Fifth day we had completed our painting and rolled up our paintings in paper to be steamed. Once out of the steamer, washed and pressed the colours were brighter and more intense. We finished our project by mounting our painting to canvas, ready to bring home and hang on our walls.



Karen teaches students from all over the world. In our class of five we had two Russians, two from England and myself. It was an amazing experience! I learned so much and I'm excited to incorporate what I learned into my fibre art.

In between road trips and summer festivals, I found time for a few fun fibre days. Two of those days were spent at Heidi Hunter's Runs With Scissors Studio. I cannot say enough about the vibrant, inspiring space that Heidi has created on her property at Winnipeg Beach. In the company of 11 intrepid crafter/artists, I spent two days with fibre artist and teacher Tamara Klassen. On the first day we learned all about the natural materials in Manitoba that can be used to dye fibre. Then we tried our hands at eco-dyeing a silk scarf and developing dye baths out of things like marigolds and madder. We all felt like sorceresses as we pulled our samples out of each dye pot. Tamara is a well-organized and knowledgeable teacher of all things fibre and I left, inspired to try a little sorcery of my own on my patio this fall. The second day with Tamara was spent learning all about the traditional Japanese art of Sashiko stitching. Learning to create the traditional geometric patterns looked daunting, but with Tamara's skill and patience we were soon sitting under the trees engrossed in this meditative art form. Most importantly, traditional Sashiko can be a jumping off point for creating innovative stitch patterns and embellishments for all kinds of fibre art. These two days have inspired me, as workshop coordinator, to share. Watch the TFAM calendar for stitch and dye workshops this fall and next spring.

TFAM Executive Retreat 2019

Manitoba Moments has toured around the province with accolades at every stop and is still on the move. Several pieces have been sold along the way. The ICE exhibit is on its way and we are excited about next year's show.

TFAM will continue to build itself as an official organization. The finances, by-laws and regulations have been updated and improved. This is very much behind the scenes for most members but very important for a viable, long-term organization.

We also found time for wonderful meals, wine, swims, canoeing and fibre talk. Thanks to Elaine for hosting the group.

An active Craftsperson within Winnipeg for 20 years and proud member of TFAM (Textile and Fibre Artists of Manitoba), Maureen Winnicki Lyons divides her

Born in Manitoba, MWL was raised in Beausejour. Lives in Winnipeg with her partner and four children.




Judy Stupak

Judy is a quilter, crafter and fibre artist. Playing with fabrics as long as she can remember has led her to the creation and improvisation of her own designs.

Learning and exploring are an intrinsic part of Judy's nature. Having worked in many different crafts, Judy has now made quilting her passion. From registering in classes to learning new techniques, Judy now explores different methods and incorporates the ideas from other craft disciplines to her quilting projects.

Pieces of Judy's fibre art have been donated and auctioned off for worthy local charities. Her quilted postcards are miniature works of art and have been

mailed around the world. She has also sold work at major juried craft shows and has won awards for her quilts.

Although Linda had been sewing since she was a young girl, she didn't begin quilting until 1997 when her husband's job brought them back to Manitoba from Ontario. Linda was living in a small community and joined the local quilt guild to meet people and learn quilting. She started doing traditional quilting but found that her personality and the repetition of the same block did not get along. She decided that maybe art quilting was what she should look into and after taking a class in landscaping quilting at Quilt Canada in 2004 and then several more classes on portrait quilting and thread painting, Linda had found her "thing". Linda never find herself bored and tired of repetition anymore and often has to control the urge to move on to a new idea or technique before she has finished that last one. Linda believes she may have a bit of attention deficit when it comes to new projects appearing in her field of vision. Linda doesn't think there is anything more satisfying than standing back and looking at a finished project that has turned out just like you hoped it would and sometimes even better than expected.



She thinks maybe one of the things that attract her to fibre art is that there is no right or wrong way to do things; there is just your way.

Colour with a U

You should read it once more. And then once more again.

I have been encouraging fellow fibre artists to enter "Colour with a U", the upcoming SAQA Canadian exhibit opening in March 2020. A few artists have told me they are having difficulty finding their creative inspiration for this show. I have encouraged them to read the Call for Entry several times, focusing on one section at a time. The theme is very broad, the size has very few restrictions and many interpretations are possible, making the choice challenging.

So, I encourage you to read the call again, find a phrase that speaks to you, let it simmer in your artistic brain and then be inspired to create. Some of the words I like are unusual, unexpected, unbound (you mean we don't have to finish the edges?) and uncanny; all words to describe fibre art and fibre artists. The theme is Canadian values of diversity and inclusion; our art is certainly diverse and includes anything and everything we can dream of. There are questions asked such as 'How do you colour yourself into our Canadian culture?' Your art can answer one of these questions.

One discouraged member just wrote to say she has found her creative spark with a further reading of the prospectus and is off and running with enthusiasm. There is still four months before the January 3, 2020 deadline, which gives us plenty of time to work.

And while you are visiting the SAQA site, watch out for more news about the SAQA 2020 Conference in Toronto. I hope to see you there.
